"Die diefstal sal ons nie raak nie. Ons het nog baie voorraad in ons pakhuisse. Die slagoffers wat ons bystaan, sal nie geraak word nie."

Toedaa ingebreek is, was hulle huis besig om pakkies vir slagoffers van die onlangs brande in Kaapstad saam te stel wat al hul besittings verloor het, onder meer skoolkleren en skryfbehoeftes.

In Gift of the Givers se bestaan van 30 jaar is daar net tweeeer by hulle ingebreek. In albei gevalle is baie min artikels gevat, het Sooliman gesê.

"Gemeenskappe staan ons gewoonlik baie by. Oral waar ons gaan, het ons 'n goeie verhouding met die polisie en gemeenskap."

Sooliman sê een van die verdagtes se ouers het Dinsdagoggend by die kantoor opgedaad en om verskoning gevra. Hul seun het nie gesteelo nie, maar het van die gesteelo die goedere gekoop.

"Ons geloof in Suid-Afrika bly sterk. Misdaigers moet al daardie energie wat hulle gebruik om misdaad te pleeg, omskep in positiewe energie en hul lewe verander," sê Sooliman.

'n Saak is by die Lansdowne-polisiekantoor aanhangig gemaak.

Toe die persele deursoek is, is verskeie gesteelo eiendom teruggevind wat deer 'n verteenwoordiger van Gift of the Givers as hul eiendom geïdentifiseer is.

Tien verdagtes, mans en vroue van 20 tot 40 jaar oud, is in heugen geneem weens die besit van vermoedelik gesteelo eiendom. Hulle word by die Philippi-polisiekantoor aangehou.

Kapt. Frederick van Wyk, 'n polisiewoordvoerder, sê by navraag hulle het inligting ontvang oor vier persele in Hanover Park wat vermoede lijk gesteelo eiendomberg.

"Die eiendom was van 'n huissbraak en diefstal by die persele van 'n organisasie sonder winsbejag," sê Van Wyk.



Moratorium on WC school closures stays in place

A MORATORIUM on school closures in the province remained in place, the Western Cape Education Department (WCED) confirmed yesterday, pending a review of legislation.

Education MEC, David Maynier, said no schools would be closed until a report on the way forward was developed.

"A moratorium on school closures still applies."

"Having looked at the Standard Parameters for Closure and Merger of Micro Public Schools, and the Guidelines for Rationalisation and Realignment of Public Schools – A Holistic Approach, we're not sure this is the best way to approach the unique circumstances of each school."

"We want to develop our own data-driven policy in line with our vision before proceeding. In light of this, I have placed a moratorium on school closures, pending a review of our approach," said Maynier.

Teachers union, the SA Democratic Teachers Union's (Sadtu), provincial secretary, Sibongile Kwazi, said they were happy that the moratorium still applied.

"Over the past six months, no schools in the province have closed and this was the approach Maynier took to recover from learning losses during the global Covid-19 pandemic."

"This is a good approach because now it means no children will be placed at a disadvantage and risk losing out on any more academics due to the possibility of permanent closure."

"We know that many factors are a result for schools to close but glad this was the stance taken by Maynier," said Kwazi.

Kwazi further said while they would only have a clearer picture of unplaced pupils once schools reopened on January 18, they would keep tabs and intervene where necessary.

"We are keeping an eye on it and will especially assist in hotspot areas. We won't be able to make an assessment yet and don't know the depth of the challenge yet for this year, we are committed to assisting as soon as schools reopen to mitigate any challenges for our pupils," said Kwazi.

Last year, in a report, Basic Education Minister Angie Motshekga identified six schools in the province as "non-viable", another six were identified for "rationalisation" and 10 were closed or merged since 2020.

Since 2021, the department confirmed 1 503 schools in South Africa were closed.

20-year search for missing children agony for families

FOR more than 20 years, at least 14 families in the Western Cape are still searching for their missing children.

Police spokesperson FC van Wyk said there were currently 14 cases of missing children under investigation in the province since 1994.

Ten of the children were under 12.

"The Standard Operational Procedures are applied to all missing persons. No matter age grouping."

"Each and every case receives urgent and immediate attention."

"Co-operation from immediate family and community members is the biggest challenge police face when it comes to missing person cases."

"Lack of parental and caretaker supervision is a huge concern."

"Children are left playing/wandering outside without proper supervision," Van Wyk said.

In most cases, children were found dead after being raped and killed by

family members or family friends, said Western Cape Missing Persons founder, Candice van der Rhee.

"The first hour is the golden hour, the child can be anywhere after that."

"It just takes about 30 minutes to get the child out of the township."

"There is a baby that is still missing after the caregiver left the baby with a stranger to go inside a bottle store."

"When she came out the child was missing. The child is yet to be found. People need to know who they are leaving their children with. Children need to have someone supervise their kids at all times."

According to Van der Rhee, with cases of missing babies, it was very difficult to trace the child because the infant cannot walk.

"It could be trafficking, it takes an hour to leave the city and once that child is out of the province it becomes increasingly difficult to find the child."

Van der Rhee was instrumental in helping to find the bodies of 3-year-old Courtney Pieters from Elsies River

and 10-year-old Chanel McCrawl from Manenberg, who were both raped and murdered.

She said there were children who have been missing for years, that she would never stop looking for.

One such case was that of 2-month-old Kai-isha Meniers, who was snatched by an unknown woman outside Shoprite in Bishop Lavis in April last year.

"After a while the case just goes cold, and the families are left with the heavy burden of not knowing where their loved one is, they cannot find closure. I am a mother and a grandmother that's why I will never give up on those children," she said.

Missing Children SA's national co-ordinator, Bianca van Aswegen, said there were no longer statistics available to give a proper indication on how many children went missing a year in South Africa. "The last stats released by the Missing Persons Bureau of South Africa was in 2013."

"We do see an increase in cases

being reported to our organisation yearly. This is of great concern."

She added that children went missing for various reasons, including children who ran away mostly due to abuse; kidnappings; human trafficking and other crime related issues.

"Parents and guardians should educate themselves on safety measures that can be taken when it comes to our children."

"Educate our children from a young age on how to keep themselves safe. Parents and guardians are urged to monitor their children's social media use, as that is one of the biggest platforms where children are groomed and lured for trafficking purposes."

Activists emphasised that time was of utmost importance and there was no waiting period in reporting a child or a person as missing.

Dad fails in bid to block mom's move with daughter

SIMPLY because the mother has had a child with the father does not mean that her entitlement to a life of her own must be discounted and ignored, while he can continue as he chooses and directs, a judge said.

This was in allowing the mother of a 2-year-old to relocate to another province with her daughter.

The mother turned to the high court sitting in Pietermaritzburg, as the father of the child refused her permission to relocate the child. The parties were never married.

They broke up when the child was 14 months old and had a parenting plan in place, which, among others, stated that neither party would be allowed to relocate outside the borders of KwaZulu-Natal and/or South Africa without the other party's written consent. This would not be unreasonably withheld or delayed, the plan continued.

The father steadfastly refused to consent and said the mother was welcome to relocate to Cape Town if she so wanted, but she had to leave the child behind. This was one of many submissions by the father that had Judge David Mossop raising his eyebrows. The judge questioned how a father who loved his child could ever suggest that such a child should remain behind without her mother.

Judge Mossop, in a judgment delivered this week, also questioned whether the father expected the mother to stay put until the child was no longer a minor – simply because it suited his needs.

The mother told the court that she wanted to relocate to Cape Town in pursuit of more lucrative employment at the company she worked for. She said with her current salary she could not make ends meet and her parents had to assist her financially every month. However, with her new position in Cape Town she would have a few thousand rand a month extra, especially as she will be living with her parents there.

In terms of the non-relocation clause in the parenting plan, the consent of the father is required for her proposed relocation, which he is refusing. According to the father, a few thousand a month extra is not a significant financial advantage to warrant relocation and he proposed that she find another job so he could continue seeing his child.

Judge Mossop said: "While the parenting plan was to be a roadmap for the future rearing of the minor child by the parties, and while it was intended to provide certainty to them, it was not intended to be immutable."

Regarding the father's argument that the mother go but the child stay behind, the judge referred to another case where it was said that despite the constitutional commitment to equality, the division of parenting roles in South Africa remained largely gender-based. It is still predominantly women who care for children and that reality appears to be reflected in many custody arrangements on divorce.

Judge Mossop said the father's attitude in this case revealed much about him as a person and the values to which he ascribed, especially if he was prepared for a child to stay behind when her mother relocated.

"He appears to hold the view that the applicant's career is an irrelevancy and that her rights to it are subservient to his rights. His rights and interests trump hers."

The judge referred to one of several messages sent by the father to the mother, in which he said; "I want someone who supports me and has my back and makes me feel like I am the breadwinner and the man of the house. I did not feel that with us ... you were too busy trying to compete or prove yourself ... I wanted you to be there to treat me like I was your king for supporting our family."

The judge concluded the woman had a right to a life of her own and while the father may still see the child, she may move to Cape Town.

Parents digging deep for back-to-school stationery

THE rush for bargains on school stationery is well under way, as supermarkets are still overflowing with parents and their children gearing up for the first day of school next week.

The Cape Times observed parents spending no less than R1 000 on a small basket of stationery items on Monday.

The stationery list for a pupil starting Grade 5 includes exercise books, four 43g Pritts, Prestik, a ream of photocopy paper, files, scissors, an eraser, a sharpener, an English dictionary and drawing boards.

Nancy D'Oliveira from Athlone said stationery was expensive, and children either lost it during the year or they didn't use it at all. "My husband paid R1 200 at Checkers. I paid R300 for hardcovers at PEP."

"Last week, I had to buy three extra books for my son, who will start Grade 7, for R460, but it included the bag," said D'Oliveira.

Babalwa Mxhalisa, an unemployed single mother from Mfuleni, said stationery shopping was stressful.

"I'm shopping for my son, who will start Grade 2. A lot is needed; I cannot afford all of them, even though my son needs to have all the listed items.

"The most expensive item on the list is Typex butterfly assorted bright paper. Currently, I have spent R415 on stationery, and I must still buy more items and renew his school uniform."

Nombasa Ngangelizwe-Nomanza from Khayelitsha said she bought stationery from different shops.

I started stationery shopping in December when I was buying Christmas clothes, now I have to buy the rest of the items. I am shopping for my daughter, who will start Grade 7, and my Grade 1 son. I already spent R800, and I have not completed the list," she said.

Western Cape Education Department spokesperson, Bronagh Hammond, said all learners required basic stationery items.

"The provision of stationery

to learners is either funded by the school's Norms and Standards funding, and provided to learners.

"This is applicable to non-section 21 schools only (schools that receive allocations of stationery and textbooks from the government).

"In other instances, some schools request parents to procure stationery in terms of their requirements at a cost to parents as per a prescribed list.

"To date – for the financial year 2022/23 – R39.5 million has been

spent on stationery goods," she said.

"This includes stationery procured for non-section 21 schools and new schools. There may be circumstances where parents find it difficult to buy a uniform.

"Some parents simply cannot afford to do so.

"We suggest that parents discuss this issue with the school in these circumstances so that an agreement can be reached to accommodate the needs of the child," said Hammond.

belong to them. It is time we also engage with law enforcement agencies about this matter," she said.

Community activist Nokwalo Tshemese said the land was small, with many shacks, resulting in overcrowding and reblocking impossibilities.

Boozi said there was a development under way that would alleviate overcrowding in the area. "A total of 1 500 households will be relocated to the development.

"This is part of a multiphased-integrated implementation approach, aimed at ensuring that residents are accommodated in a safe, properly-serviced human settlement."

In Khayelitsha, where 192 residents were displaced, people were disgruntled. Town Two resident, Xoliswa

Mase, said: "I'm shocked and unhappy. I seriously don't know why these officials came here, because they left us in the same situation they found us. They just argued alone and promised to assist us to get our identity documents."

"They didn't ask where we have been sleeping, and we didn't hear anything about relocation. I have been here since 1995. Our government just doesn't care about us."

Residents said they had no choice but to rebuild in the area as there was no clear way forward for them.

While in Philippi, Kubayi said she would engage with Home Affairs Minister Aaron Motsoaledi to waive costs for fire victims in all areas as residents pleaded with her to intervene since they lost birth certificates and IDs.

Joyous 'umgidi' for son who fled initiation school

Mthatha village youth turned up at uncle's home in Komani 21 days later

The Mdladla family of Qedlana village in Mthatha have finally thrown a big party and thanks-giving ceremony for their son Ntsika, who fled stark naked from his initiation school just hours after being circumcised, and walked 250km to an uncle's home.

Ntsika, who said he had been tortured at the school, disappeared on November 29 and was missing for 21 days. His family believed he was dead.

But to everyone's surprise, at 2am on December 20, Ntsika knocked on the door of his uncle Sitoto Nkanunu's home in Machibini village, near Komani, hungry, dehydrated and traumatised.

He was wearing a T-shirt and jeans he had stolen off a washing line.

At the weekend, his father, Gcinikhaya Mdladla, 54, mother, Nonyameko Mdladla, 48, and grandmother Nomakhisana Nokhangela Mdladla, 78, joined by Ntsika's uncle and other family members, threw a big *umgidi* attended by more than 300 people.

They thanked all those who assisted, including Archbishop Tshepo Machae, children's rights activist Petros Majola and AbaThembu traditional leader

Nkosi Minenku Joyi.

"Here is our son, healthy and strong with his circumcision wound healed 100%, because of God's miracle ways."

"This is a worthy celebration. Almost 20 initiates have died while in the care of trained

traditional nurses, but my son Ntsika was on his own, in the wilderness. But God looked after him - it's a miracle."

He said the family had wept bitter tears and accepted Ntsika was dead, and had merely

hoped to retrieve his body and give him a dignified funeral.

"But, today we all have tears of joy and happiness."

Among the celebrations were parades of horses, *umdyarho*, mock stick-fighting and tradi-

tional dances.

As a true *ikrwa*, Ntsika was barefooted, painted in red ochre, and covered from head to toe with a traditional blanket.

In the morning, a group of

village men led Ntsika to the family animal kraal from his old initiation lodge, singing the initiation chant, *Somagwaza*, and other AbaThembu traditional songs.

Elders shared words of

wisdom.

Ntsika's mother, Nonyameko, was ecstatic, ululating and leading other women in traditional dances.

"I thought I would be burying Ntsika today, but instead we are celebrating his homecoming."

"As a mother I have all the reasons to celebrate. For 21 days during his disappearance I had sleepless nights, and now it's time to celebrate."

Ntsika's grandmother, Nomakhisana, said: "Now my grandson is back healthy and strong. I think it is also time that my son must now relax and celebrate. My daughter-in-law and I were hard on him as if it was him who made him disappear."

A shy Ntsika said: "I am just happy that the whole family, parents, friends and the village are here celebrating God's work. I would not be here alive if not for God's work."

"I don't know how I survived all that adversity and I don't want to even comment about it, but I'm thankful that I am alive and my family is celebrating."

His father slaughtered a cow and four sheep to welcome his son while his mother brewed hundreds of litres of *umqombosho*.

Majola travelled from his Ngqushwa home to celebrate with the family.

"This is a happy ending and I am excited to see the family happy and joyful. I wish all the best for Ntsika and his family."

Ard Matthews retires from Cape to Rio Race

South African rock singer and wannabe trans Atlantic sailor Ard Matthews has retired from the Cape to Rio Yacht Race due to a damaged rig. A post on Matthews' Facebook page confirmed the retirement a week into the gruelling race between Cape Town and Rio de Janeiro in Brazil, a distance of about 3,500 nautical miles.

Matthews and his crew were attempting to "cross the pond" in their 56-year-old yacht The Impossible Machine, which took part in the inaugural Cape to Rio Race more than half a century ago. Matthews had hoped to use the voyage to escalate his sailing pedigree and record music at sea.

The unrelenting South Atlantic forced the crew to divert to St Helena island where they will assess the rigging damage.

"For our Grand Old Dame, this race is over," Matthews said in a Facebook post.

"I am almost tempted to say

sadly, but my heart is filled only with extreme pride at how well she performed under the stress imposed on her 56-year-old frame in this ambitious attempt to complete the 2023 Cape to

Rio Race. "We drove her hard and she responded magnificently. We may have, in our eagerness and sheer joy under sail, not listened close enough when she creaked

and groaned, until finally her rig parted. We have no choice despite our best efforts at repair under way to retire from the race, and make for St Helena, where I will reassess our

situation," Matthews said.

Matthews, an award-winning musician and frontman of rock group Just Jinjer, has in recent years added boating to his achievements.

In 2020 he acquired The Impossible Machine (TIM), formerly known as The Howard Davis, a classic 66-foot wooden sailing vessel commissioned by the South African navy in 1966. The vessel has completed several Atlantic crossings in addition to the inaugural 1971 Cape to Rio Race.

The musician completed his skipper's ticket in April last year. In his Facebook post Matthews said he had no regrets about entering the race: "If life's races are measured by trophies or journeys by distance travelled, TIM's cabinet would be full and her log immeasurable," he said.

Two vessels have retired from this year's race, with the remaining 13 expected to cross the finishing line from later this month.

How to prepare yourself for the back-to-school chaos

The anticipated chaos and mayhem set to hit roads as the holiday season ends and schools reopen in the Eastern Cape next week can be eased with simple strategies, and a large amount of patience.

As the new school year starts, parents are warned to expect difficulties on day one that will ease as traffic patterns smooth, lift clubs are established, extra mural activities before and after school begin and new routines become established.

"But to begin with, it's a nightmare. Load-shedding schedules are unpredictable and can change at the last minute so it is impossible to plot the peak hour traffic flow in advance," said Esther Schmidt, operations manager for traffic engineering at the Johannesburg Roads Agency.

Motorists heading to schools and work are advised to plan for chaos, leave extra early and wait at least a week before altering their schedules or expecting an improvement in traffic patterns.

With Gauteng schools opening on Wednesday this week Schmidt said on Tuesday: "Our engineers will be out on site tomorrow, particularly at new schools opening for the first time. They will be able to respond to issues and come up with solutions."

Schmidt said anticipating where the traffic was going to snarl so as to avoid this on the first day was not possible due to the unpredictable nature of load-shedding stages, and the fact that the start of the school year was a once-a-year event that tended to ease within a few days as lift clubs are established, scholar transport sorted, scholar patrols set up and school pointsmen settled.

"To start we recommend parents of children starting at a new school do a dry run or two before the time and do homework on the best route to take. Then leave at least half an hour earlier, especially on the first day. If you leave on time or a bit late you risk not being on time," Schmidt said.

"Respect other drivers and exercise a lot of patience. We want to urge people to drop their children at proper drop-off zones rather than getting impatient and dropping them on the side of the road, a location that is not safe."

She said the start of school draws record amounts of traffic that generally ease and spread out over coming days, both in the morning and afternoon peak times.

"It's overwhelming for many people in the beginning and you feel like you will never be on time ever again."

No plans 'for now' to build bridge despite Cala drownings

The Eastern Cape government has no plans "for now" to build a bridge for the Mthingwevu community in Cala.

This is despite three people drowning in two incidents while crossing the river on December 28.

Heavily pregnant Nom-pumelelo Dyangili, 29, Majompalo Njili and Zwelenkosi Dyarihiwe drowned when the bakkies they were travelling in

were swept away by the strong river currents.

The community says the situation is dire as children, some just starting grade R, and frail elderly people have to cross the notorious Mthingwevu River near Cala, which has claimed about 15 lives since 2010.

This week, provincial transport department spokesperson Unathi Binqose said it "acknowledges the less than ideal state that the road is in, and the commitment to get it done

there."

"A proper bridge would be ideal as a long-term solution, but it is not in our plans for now."

"Road engineers have been deployed there to check what could have caused so much damage to this stretch of the road that has held its own for many years."

"We will certainly need to come up with a temporary solution while we seek a long-term solution to the problem."

On wet days residents are cut off from the rest of the world because they cannot cross the Mthingwevu River as there is no bridge between Zingquthu and Lixeni.

In dry weather, community members ford the river using shallow areas and logs, but when there has been rain they have to wait for hours, or even days, for the water to subside.

Community leaders have made impassioned pleas to premier Oscar Mabuyane and transport MEC Xolile Nqatha to intervene, saying that since 1998 promises had been made that a bridge would be built but nothing had come of them 25 years down the line.

Binqose said the department would not lie to any community on issues of service delivery.

"The community raised its

officials to rather be unpopular with community members by telling the truth about what we can do, given the many challenges we are faced with, from financial constraints to sometimes human resources."

"This is better than gaining short-lived popularity by making empty promises."

Binqose said the stretch of decaying road was 18km long.

"We had done 9km last year before the rains came and washed it all away."

"There is no point now in doing the remaining 9km—we have to start afresh and that is what we are committing to many hours after one another."

"It is also bad that even the premier is saying nothing about the situation here despite three people drowning in two different incidents in one day, a few hours after one another."

"And in 2016 engineers were here talking about this bridge. We have an uncaring government."

"It is also bad that the premier is saying nothing about the situation here despite three people drowning in two different incidents in one day, a few hours after one another."

"We are disappointed in the government, which now shows it doesn't care."

Sakhasizwe mayor Bonishe Ponoshe said: "I know about this—that area is inaccessible when it rains."

"The community raised its plight with us and the provincial government a long time ago."

"The provincial government has already done assessments and promised to build a bridge, which we are still waiting for."
