No budget for squatter camp

THE residents of Msholozi squatter camp in Mpumalanga will not be receiving any services at all.

This is because the Mbombela Local Municipality has not budgeted for them.

Mbombela's Mayor Cathy Dlamini said Msholozi, outside White River, was illegally occupied and it was not part of the municipality's development plans.

"Even though we have talked about development in Msholozi, you will remember that the place is owned by the National Department of Public Works. Municipal laws prohibit us from taking services to areas we do not own, so there are not going to be services there.

"We have to speak to the Department of Public Works first to transfer the land to us," Dlamini said.

Asked about the deaths of four children who were electrocuted in Msholozi due to illegal electricity connections, Dlamini said the area had many problems that could not be solved.

Three-year-old Antonia Manyike became the fourth child to be electrocuted in the area over the past two years.

Her mother, Athalia Manyike, said that if the ANCled municipality could not accommodate Msholozi in their plans, then residents would have to find an alternative party to vote for.

"The ANC came here looking for votes in the past election, but now that we have problems they run away from us. The money they have is worth spending in towns and other areas, not here where they also got votes," Athalia said. - AENS

Dead easy work for thugs

ONLY the worst kind of thugs rob the dead.

Recently, more than 10 tombstones have been either vandalised or stolen from the Tshikota Cemetery, near Makhado in Limpopo.

The discovery was made this week when a family went to the cemetery to arrange for a new grave to be dug.

Mapula Maluleke, who found that her mum's tombstone was missing, told Daily Sun: "We spent a lot of money on the tombstone to appease my mum's soul.

"I am afraid to buy another one because thugs will do the same thing again.

We have reported the matter to the Makhado Police Station and we hope that they arrest the perpetrators.'

The local chairman for the

Ngoako Motheketlela, said it

SA National Civic Organisation,

was the first incident of its kind in the area.

"We are working with the police to speed up the investigation," he said.

"Our first suspects are people who run a tombstone business. So many tombstones have been vandalised."

Police spokesman Warrant Officer Takalani Madzhigili said the cops are investigating cases of malicious damage to property and theft.

He appealed to the public to help with any information that could lead to the arrest of the perpetrators.

"Similar incidents have happened at Gogobole, Tshiozwi, Madabani, Madombidzha and Bungeni," said Madzhigili. In 2010 the Hawks were

brought in to investigate after 31 graves were vandalised at the Musina Cemetery, among them that of Orlando Pirates striker Lesley Manyathela.
