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1. OVERVIEW

The following document contains copies of the entire Public Participation Process that has been run up to the completion of the Basic Assessment Report (BAR).

The Public Participation Process was planned and facilitated by the independent assessment service provider (EndemicVision Environmental Services) following the following framework:




FIGURE 1: STAKEHOLDER ENGAGEMENT FRAMEWORK

Stakeholder engagement was based on the National Environmental Management Act (Act. No 107 of 1998) and industry best practice guideline by Department of Environmental Affairs and Development Planning, Guideline on Public Participation 2009. Guidance to stakeholder engagement in further phases will be based on the suggestions that will be made in the Environmental Management Plan (EMP) on the basis of the outcome of the stakeholder engagement process and the subsequent environmental authorization.

Chapter 1 of the NEMA outlines the principles of environmental management, several pertaining to public participation; and

The EIA Regulations promulgated in June 2014 in GN R982, Chapter 6 specify the minimum requirements for public participation in an EIA under NEMA:

The minimum requirements for public participation in an Environmental Impact Assessment under NEMA requiring public participation are sections 54, 55, 56, 57.

The public participation process commenced on the 2016/11/28 and the provisional list of stakeholders were notified via SMS Notifications of its commencement.

To date a key stakeholder list has been compiled to determine the key stakeholders that will be engaged in the public participation process. This stakeholder list will continuously be updated throughout the participation process. A Comments & Response Report has also been compiled from initial comments received from I & APs.

Communication documents have been drafted and distributed to the general public and identified stakeholders via electronic mail or other requested methods. This includes the Background Information Document (BID); posters and advertisements.

The BID contains the following information:

- A simplified description of the proposed project, and a rationale for it,
- A map indicating the extent of the proposed project area,
- The Environmental Impact Assessment Process and Stakeholder Engagement Process to be followed,

Invitations to register as an I&AP and to participate in the basic Assessment Process and Public Participation Process and a description of how and when stakeholders can contribute during the environmental authorization and Public Participation Process was sent to I&APs via electronic mail, SMS Notifications or other requested methods.

The posters and advertisements indicate that EndemicVision Environmental Services initiated the public participation process for the prospecting right and associated infrastructural activities in respect of BMM's property, Portion 4 of Farm Zuurwater 62.

Furthermore, it indicated the purpose of the proposed project, the activities that will be undertaken, as well as the fact that a Basic Assessment Report (BAR) process need to be completed in terms of the National Environmental Management Act (No. 107 of 1998) and the Mineral and Petroleum Resources Development Act (No. 28 of 2002).

Lastly the advertisement specified that EndemicVision Environmental Services (Pty) Ltd. has been appointed to conduct the Basic Assessment and Public Participation Process for the project. Subsequently stakeholders have been invited to register as I&APs and to participate in the process before or on 2016/12/12.

Advertisements and posters have been placed in Die Plattelander (2016/11/11) and at strategically positioned sites such as the local municipalities and other public offices.

A regulatory waiting period of 30 days has been given for stakeholders to register as interested and/or affected (I&APs).

The DBAR was submitted for commenting to the DENC in February 2017. At the end of the public review period of DBAR / EMP Report and the stakeholder engagement report was updated and the issues raised and received in writing on the FBAR / EMP Report was incorporated into the CRR to accompany the FBAR / EMP Report.

After the competent authorities have accepted/denied the FBAR / EMP Report, registered I&APs will be notified of authorities' decision and appeals procedure.

2. STAKEHOLDER PROFILE

The affected properties are owned by Black Mountain Mine and form part of the existing mining right (Ref: 2005/040096/07; MPT Number: SNC51MRC).

Other I&APs include Organs of State, who have jurisdiction over, or may have an interest in the proposed prospecting project. Adjacent landowners, other non-governmental organisations and/or private persons are included. A list of all the stakeholders is included in Table 4.

Adjacent landowners were identified through the use of Geographical Information Systems (GIS) maps and consultation with Black Mountain Mine for contact details from their existing stakeholder list. The affected and adjacent farm properties are illustrated in the figure below.

The project zone of influence is summarized in the Table 1 below.




FIGURE 2: SITE MAP INDICATING ADJACENT LANDOWNERS

Concluding Remarks on Stakeholder Consultation

A concern for dust pollution and the influx of job seekers to the area and potential increase in theft or crime due to job seekers and/or drilling personnel on site has also been raised.




FIGURE 10: BID PAGE 3




FIGURE 11: BID PAGE 4
