1 Introduction

Here are my drawings numbered 202-1A 202-2 and 202-3 which support an application to the National Monuments Council on behalf of my client.

The first stage of this venerable building was completed in 1849. The second stage was completed in 1869. Sometime in 1950 a most unsightly and inappropriate lean-to was cobbled on to the building on the south elevation. Later the building was declared a National Munument, it being the oldest Anglican School in South Africa. The School has been maintained by the Anglican Community of the Resurrection of our Lord since 1918, who are now faced with essential restoration and rebuilding. The likely cost of this work will be well beyond the means of my client the Community of the Resurrection of our Lord.

2 Proposed Restoration

- 2.1 Re-painting the external stonework
- 2.2 Replacing or repairing the timber windows
- 2.3 Replacing or repairing the timber doors
- 2.4 Removing and replacing defective plaster
- 2.5 Replacing defective suspended timber floors
- 2.6 Replacing the defective corrugated iron roof
- 2.7 Redecorating and effecting other sundry remedial works

3 Proposed Rebuilding

The existing toilets shown on the 1:50 plan are both unsanitary and inadequate for the numbers of pupils and staff. They must be demolished and replaced.

It is therefore proposed to erect a new Toilet Block in the manner indicated on drawing numbered 202-1A. The cost of using local Witteberg Quartzite for the new walls is prohibitive and I propose to build a plinth on the east only but in similar but undressed stone. The walls above

would be plastered and finished with a colour in keeping with the splendid russet colour which the Witteberg Quartzite achieves after weathering for about thirty years.

The metal window on the east elevation of the lean-to will be replaced with a new timber window matching the existing windows on the North Elevation. This window design would be repeated in the original gable where the original windows have been incorrectly replaced with foreign windows. A similar window would be used in the east gable of the Toilet Block.

The design of the Toilet Block is obviously a compromise and I welcome observations and suggestions from your learned collections on the Legal Committee

your learned colleagues on the Local Committee.

4 Financial Assistance

My clients have asked me to appeal to the National Monuments Council for financial assistance. The cost of the remedial work described is so beyond the means of the Community that they rely on such financial assistance as the Council may be able to offer.



Further to our interview some little time ago, and following the suggestion which I received personally through Mrs. Kretzmann last week, I write to make a formal enquiry as to the possibility of some financial contribution from the National Monuments Council, towards the cost of renovating the Good Shepherd School building in Huntly Street, Grahamstown. The building is a proclaimed National Monument, dating from the middle of the 19th century, and the fabric of the building has deteriorated considerably in recent years; I should think the prolonged drought in the Eastern Cape has contributed to the deterioration both of woodwork and of masonry.

The cost of the restoration work has been estimated at R105 000, excluding the architect's fees; this amount has been estimated separately from the cost of the new toilet block being erected at the back of the school, which may be regarded as a separate project.

The School has for many years served a disadvantaged sector of the Grahamstown Coloured community, and though it lies in the middle of a White residential area, it has never been closed by the Department. Despite its distance from the area from which all its pupils come, its enrolment has risen through the years to its present level of 175 pupils, some of whom are children of parents who themselves received their schooling at the Good Shepherd School. It seems therefore to be making a valued contribution to the education of children whose parents are by no means affluent. This year, an unusually high number of Xhosa-speaking children have been enrolled.



Apart from contributions we hope to receive from bodies such as your Council, the Community, i.e. the Community (or Sisterhood) of the Resurrection, is liable for the cost of all renovations and new buildings, as the entire property belongs to the Sisterhood. The Department of Education and Training pays the salaries of the teaching staff and contributes towards the cost of cleaning, lights and water, but all other costs are borne by the Sisterhood.

You will appreciate, therefore, that we would be grateful for any contribution which your Council may be able to make towards the cost of renovating this historic building.

Thank you for your letter of 26 July with regard to the award by the Council of R25 000 for the restoration of the Good Shepherd School. This is good news indeed, and we are deeply grateful to the Council for their generosity.

I do not know in what form a "claim for payment" of the award needs to be made, but I will attach to this a separate letter making such an application.

Perhaps I should mention that the initial approach to the Council regarding the possibility of such an award was made through yourself by the Architect, Mr. Jan van Heerden; you subsequently came to visit me to discuss the matter and you very kindly undertook to pursue it with the National Council. May I express my personal gratitude to you for pursuing it with such success.

With regard to the scrutiny of plans for alterations to a National Monument, I have to advise that the Architect, Mr. Jan van Heerden, approached the Council (I would assume that it would have been through the Regional Office) for approval of his plans before the restoration work was commenced, and as he is a very experienced and meticulously businesslike architect, I am sure he must have received the Council's approval before the work was actually undertaken. The additions and renovations to the School have actually already been completed, though the funds so far subscribed still fall far short of the required total. The Community has in the meantime provided "bridging finance" in the hope that continued fund-raising efforts will eventually make it possible for the loan to be repaid to the Community (i.e. the Community of the Resurrection of our Lord).

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

APPLICATION FOR CAPITAL GRANT, GOOD SHEPHERD SCHOOL, HUNTLEY STREET, GRAHAMSTOWN



BACKGROUND

This school is the oldest in the Eastern Cape having been erected in 1848. It was the first school building of St Andrews College and has retained its use as a school building throughout the years. At the moment the school is run by the Community of the Resurrection of Our Lord, an Anglican Nunnery, as a Primary School for disadvantaged children from the townships, thus providing those children with a first class primary education, they would not have otherwise. However, this fine building is in desperate need of restoration and the Community does not have the funds.

RECOMMENDATION

If any capital allowance is to be granted anywhere in the country it should go to this project. Architecturally the building is outstanding and thus warrants a grant, and the use of the building is of great importance as it is the only school where pupils of poverty stricken backgrounds can receive as fine a primary education as anywhere, free of political interruptions. The NMC Plans Committee has already granted permission for the restoration project.

- 1. The foundation stone was laid by Mrs. Hare, wife of the Lt. Gov. of the Eastern Province, Col J. Hare, on 18 June 1844. At that time the building was intended for the Sunday School of St. George's Church, now the Cathedral. Progress was slow owing to the Kaffir War and lack of funds, and it was still being built early in 1849.
- 2. In 1849 the Vestry resolved to use the building on weekdays as a grammar school. It was formerly opened on 4 October, 1849.
- 3. At first the school was merely "the parish school" but was recognised as St. George's Cathedral Grammar School from 1857; it persisted as such until it was closed at the end of 1901.
- 4. Bishop Armstrong, consecrated first bishop of Grahamstown in 1853, founded St. Andrew's College in 1855. The first classes of the College were held in the Huntly St. building until about 1858. The principal of the grammar school became the first principal of St. Andrew's, but the earlier school did not lose issidentity.
- 5. The first Diocesan Synod was held in the building in 1860.
- 6. An eastern extension, for some time known as "The Guild Hall and Assembly Room", was added in 1869.
- 7. The building was rented by the Cape Government as a laboratory, 1902 1915, through the influence of Dr. S. Schonland.
- 8. It was then rented by the Community of the Resurrection (St. Peter's Home, Anglican) in 1916, with purchase in 1917, and transfer in 1918. The Community has used the building for educational purposes up to the present. For many years it has housed the Good Shepherd School for Coloured and Indian children, serving also as a practising school for the Grahamstown Training College. As the building is near the centre of the town this use is expected to come to an end under the Group Areas Act. The future use of the building is uncertain.
- 9. The building, including the 1869 extension, is externally of local Witteberg quartzite, weathered to a rich brown. A softer stone has been used for linels and for the interesting ornamental stonework of the east end (1869). It is now under corrugated iron roof. A lean-to in brick and plaster was added in recent years. The building is in a pleasant tree-lined street and is adjacent to the playing fields of the Victoria high School for Girls.
- 10. The building is described by Mr. H. M. Matthew, former Diocesan Secretary, "as a most interesting example of Cotswold stone work" and by Dr. R. B. Lewcock as "aGothic school".
 - 11. Used as a school from 1849 to now apart from a short break, it is believed to be the oldest Anglican school building in the Republic built for the purpose of a school. In the Grahamstown Diocese, the foundation stone of a Diocesan Grammar

School in Port Elizabeth was laid in 1856; the building was used as such for a brief period only, 1857 - 9. In the Cape Town Diocese the earliest school building of the Diocesan College was begun in 1852 and used in 1853. (The College as an institution was opened in 15 March 1849 at Protea - Bishopscourt - housed in a pre-existing cottage). St. George's Grammar School. Cape Town, was founded in 1844 existing cottage's Church Free School) but the original building used, near the present site, has disappeared.

- D. Letter from D. H. Burkinshaw, Diocesan Secretary, to J. V. L. Rennie, 26/11/63. Inter alia he says "The east extension, called 'The Guild Hall and Assembly Room" Was added in 1869. This was used as a morning school and academy for higher class female education, and also, in the evenings, as a Common Hall for safe amusements. There was some effort made at the time to get the girls' school under the guidance of a Religious Sisterhood. The first Diocesan Synod was held in the school in 1860, and Synod returned to the school in 1888".

The Diocesan Grammar School, Port Elizabeth, foundation stone was 1856.

- E. H. M. Matthew believed that the building could possibly be the oldest Anglican Church school building in South Africa (interview headed "Oldest Anglican School in Eastern Province" in the E.P. Herald, circa 1961).

 Inter alia Matthew is quoted as saying this "is a most interesting example of Cotswold stone work ", and that St. Peter's used work it for a short time as a boarding hostel for the Training College.
- F. D. McIntyre. The Diocesan College, Rondebosch, South Africa: a Century of 'Bishops'. Juta, Cape Town, 1950.
 - pp.2-3. Refers to proposed Anglican college in Cape Town; reproduces prospectus published in 1820s, but says nothing came of this proposal.
- pp. 7-8 et seq. Bishop Gray arrived in 1848. He rented Protea in 1848 and the Church bought the property in 1851 naming it Bishopscourt. Gray advertised a Collegiate School in 1849 in the S.A. Commercial Advertiser and set aside an existing building (Maynier's Cottage) for his school. The Diocesan College School was opened there on 15/3/1849, but was moved to Woodlands (the present site) in 1850. Buildings were begun there in 1852 and completed for use in 1853.
- R. B. Lewcock. Early Nineteenth Century Architecture in South Africa. Cape
 Town, 1963. Although later than the period sovered by his book, he says
 "A Gothic School was also begun in Grahamstown in 1844".
- H. H. E. Peacock, Headmaster of St. George's Grammar School, Cape Town.

 Article "Why the Grammar School" in the school magazine "The Georgian,"

 1962, pp. 19 -24. He refers to various private and officially Sponsored schools up to 1844; he states that St. George's Church Free School was opened in Sept. 1844 under the auspices of the Colonial Chaplains in the vicinity of the existing school site. The present name dates from 1858.
