


Figure 1.3: Map illustrating Bokoni settlement sequence adapted from Coetzee (2016)




Figure 4.21: DGPS plan of MX1 and MX3 showing the location of the trenches




Figure 5.4: Google Earth image illustrating road networks/systems at Moxomatsi main town
