REPORT ON THE RESULTS OF CONSULTATION

WITH COMMUNITIES AND INTERESTED AND AFFECTED PARTIES

AS REQUIRED IN TERMS OF SECTIONS, 16(4)(b) or 27 (5) (b) OF THE MINERAL AND PETROLEUM RESOURCES DEVELOPMENT ACT (ACT 28 of 2002), AND IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE STANDARD DIRECTIVE FOR THE COMPILATION THEREOF AS PUBLISHED ON THE OFFICIAL WEBSITE OF THE DEPARTMENT OF MINERAL RESOURCES.

A. Definitions

'consultation' means a two way communication process between the applicant and the community or interested and affected party wherein the former is seeking, listening to, and considering the latter's response, which allows openness in the decision making process.

'community' means a group of historically disadvantaged persons with interest or rights in a particular area of land on which the members have or exercise communal rights in terms of an agreement, custom or law: Provided that, where as a consequence of the provisions of the Act negotiations or consultations with the community are required, the community shall include the members or part of the community, directly affected by prospecting or mining, on land occupied by such members or part of the community.

'Interested and affected' parties include, but are not limited to; -

- (i) Host Communities
- (ii) Landowners (Traditional and Title Deed owners)
- (iii) Traditional Authority
- (iv) Land Claimants
- (v) Lawful land occupier
- (vi) The Department of Land Affairs,
- (vii) Any other person (including on adjacent and non-adjacent properties) whose socioeconomic conditions may be directly affected by the proposed prospecting or mining operation
- (viii) The Local Municipality,
- (ix) The relevant Government Departments, agencies and institutions responsible for the various aspects of the environment and for infrastructure which may be affected by the proposed project.

B. Report on the results of consultation

- 1. Methodology applied to consultation.
 - 1.1. Name the community or communities identified, or explain why no such community was identified.

The community of Witpoortjie and the Moses Kotane District Municipality was identified.

1.2. Specifically state whether or not the Community is also the landowner.

The community is not the land owner.

1.3. State whether or not the Department of Land Affairs been identified as an interested and affected party.

The Dept of Land Affairs was consulted to asceratin if a land claim has been lodged on the mentioned portion. It must be noted that the land is privately owned.

A land claim has been lodged by Malemela Lentswe Jacob, this could however not be confirmed by the Department of Land Affairs. The status of the land claim is also unknown.

Malemela Lentswe Jacob.

1.6. List the landowners identified by the applicant. (Traditional and Title Deed owners)

The land is owned by Thutse Mining (Pty) Ltd.

The application area is not occupied. Several small scale mining operations (legally and illegally) are conducted on the farm Witpoortjie 173 JP.

The proposed mining operations will be conducted using opencast mining methods. Because of the open cast mining this will result in land disturbances. However, the socio-economic conditions of land occupants will not be directly impacted since site rehabilitation will be undertaken and mitigation measures implemented throughout the mining process.

1.9. Name the Local Municipality identified by the applicant

Moses Kotane District Municipality.

Identification of Stakeholders

To ensure a proper representation of stakeholders interested in or affected by the proposed, the following identification methods were used to develop a stakeholder database:

- Utilisation of an existing stakeholder database;
- Conducting Windeed and related desktop searches in and around the project to verify landownership and obtain contact details;
- Responses to be received from newspaper advertisements and site notices;
- Responses on the distribution of the Background Information Document (BID);

- Telephonic and one-on-one consultations with stakeholders to identify additional I&APs.

Public Participation Materials

Considering the legislative requirements and good practice the following methods have been implemented to disseminate information to stakeholders about the proposed project.

The various PP materials used during announcement of the proposed project have been included.

- Background Information Document (BID): includes the location and a description of the proposed project, the legislative processes and requirements that will be followed, the specialist studies to be conducted, the competent authorities, and the consultation and registration process including contact details of the responsible person representing the EAP.
- Newspaper Advertisement: an English newspaper advert was placed in the Rustenburg Herald of 5 November 2021. The advert included a brief project description, information about the required legislation, the competent authorities and details of the appointed EAP.
- Site Notices: English site notices were put up at various places. The site notices contained a brief project description, information about the required legislation, the competent authorities and details of the EAP.
- Letter with Registration and Comment Sheet: a letter was sent in English which contained information about the proposed project, applicable legislation and competent authorities. A Registration and Comment Sheet was also provided for stakeholders to use for formal registration as I&APs or to submit comments

Proof of consultation is appended to this document and also desribed in the Basic Assessment Report.

The majority of the province's residents are SeTswana people who speak Tswana. Smaller groups include Afrikaans, Sotho, and Xhosa speaking people. English is spoken primarily as a second language.

No current sites of cultural significance such as initiation sites or other culturally significant sites were identified.

No sites of heritage importance exist on or near the site.

The land was used for small scale mining, being legally or illigal. The neighboring areas are used for residential purposes, farming and other mining activities.
