APPLICATION FOR PERMIT: BURIAL GROUNDS AND GRAVES

Please note: Permit Applications expire one year after the date of receipt.

In terms of Section 36 (3) of the National Heritage Resources Act, 1999 (Act No. 25 of 1999) no person may, without a permit issued by the relevant heritage resources authority:

(a) destroy, damage, alter, exhume or remove from its original position or otherwise disturb the grave of a victim of conflict, or any burial ground or part thereof which contains such graves;

(b) destroy, damage, alter, exhume or remove from its original position or otherwise disturb any grave or burial ground older than 60 years which is situated outside a formal cemetery administered by a local authority; or

(c) bring onto or use at a burial ground or grave referred to in paragraph (a) or (b) any excavation equipment, or any equipment which assists in the detection or recovery of metals.

Other application forms are available for archaeological and palaeontological material and sites, for shipwrecks, or for the export or sale of heritage objects including archaeological and palaeontological material and meteorites, and for the registration of collections. Applicants are advised that without full details no permit may be issued.

At this stage the age of the remains is unconfirmed, but it is probable that the graves are older than 60 years.

10. Brief description: Farm Nkomati 770 JT (previously Uitkomst 541 JT) at S25.74289 E30.61620, near Badplaas, Mpumalanga – several stone packed structures, three of which might possibly be graves. The structures are not aligned in any meaningful pattern. None of the structures have any form of headstone. The possible grave structures are situated at the edge of the opencast mining pit and it is imperative that, if they are graves, they be relocated as soon as possible to prevent them from being damaged by the mining operations.

This application is for the excavation and relocation of any human remains as set out above, as well as any graves that might be found additionally during the course of the exhumation process. * Please supply details on a separate sheet of paper if necessary

C. REASON FOR APPLICATION

14. Purpose of and reasons for application*

The affected possible graves are located on the edge of the opencast mining pit of the Nkomati Nickel and Chrome Mine and are therefore in imminent danger of being damaged by the mining activities. The site is also directly in the way of the expansion of the opencast pit. Due to the sensitive nature of graves, the mine wants to ensure that, if human remains are present, these are exhumed and relocated professionally. The application is therefore for a permit for the urgent "rescue" of any human remains that may be buried in the possible grave structures. Retrospective social consultation to enable eventual reburial is proposed for the graves directly affected by the opencast pit.

There have been three previous permits issued by SAHRA to PGS for the relocation of human remains at the Nkomati Mine. The first and second phases of the relocation process were conducted under permit number 80/06/11/010/51 and permit number BG/09/02/001/87. The most recent relocation process is still under way after being started in 2012 (Mbokane graves) under permit number BG/12/04/001/87.

Since the planning phase of the mine, three separate Heritage Impact Assessments were conducted, the first two in 1994 and 2000 respectively by *Archaeological Resources Management* (Archaeology Department, University of the Witwatersrand) and the third by *Archaeology Africa* in 2007/8. The 2007/2008 HIA was not legally required, but was commissioned by the mine to make sure that no Heritage Resources were inadvertently impacted upon by mining activities. The possible graves included in this application were first discovered in 2007 but were not included in any of the Heritage Reports. However, no mitigation took place at that time due to unknown reasons although a site notice was put up at the site (the notice is still on display). A copy of the 2007/2008 HIA was included in a previous application in 2012 (Mbokane graves) as a separate document.

NB: The Nkomati Mine is currently in the process of auditing its cultural resources in order to prevent a similar situation in the future.

The excavation and social consultation will be handled jointly by PGS Heritage and Martins Funerals. The remains will be reburied in a suitable formal cemetery in accordance to the requirements of the *bona fide* interested and affected parties as identified by an ongoing public consultation process. PGS Heritage has been appointed with sufficient financial provision to conduct the process in compliance with relevant legislation and to industry best practice standards.

If no one comes forward subsequent to the excavation of the possible graves, any remains uncovered will be reburied in the following cemetery: Badplaas Municipal Cemetery * Supply copies of documentation and details on a separate sheet of paper

18. Please give details of consultation with communities and individuals who by tradition have an interest in the grave(s), and of the agreement reached with such communities and individuals (as required by the Act 36 and the relevant Regulations Chaps IX and XI).

A comprehensive process of social consultation has been in place since 2006, as part of the three previous grave relocation projects. This included site and newspaper notices, with the aim of identifying any family members and negotiating the mitigation thereof with any affected and interested parties. No one claiming to be next of kin of the possible graves in question has come forward up to now. PGS is also in ongoing social consultation with families who have other graves in the area. If the structures prove to be graves on excavation, and if anyone subsequently comes forward to claim them, PGS will engage with them regarding their wishes for the graves. The most recent newspaper notice is attached as **Addendum D**.

NB: <u>Please note that PGS will be publishing legal notices in the Daily Sun and Lowvelder newspapers</u> during the next two weeks to provide further opportunity for any family members of the possible graves to contact us regarding the mitigation of any remains present.
