Please be advised as follows:-

- (1) Amafa was unable to consider the merits of the application as the work had already commenced, alternatively, has been completed;
- (2) As a result, a permit cannot now be issued;
- (3) We would like to draw your attention to the fact that your failure to obtain a permit <u>prior</u> to the commencement of the work, is in contravention of the provisions of the KwaZulu-Natal Heritage Act (4 of 2008), and as such is a <u>criminal offence</u> for which you may be prosecuted;
- (4) However, Amafa has decided to condone your failure to obtain a permit, as required, on condition that the work was conducted strictly in accordance with **Architectural Plans** (as dated) **January 14**, received by **Amafa on February 7**, 2014, and that all the work shown on the application is completed within a calendar year of the date of this letter.
- (5) Prior written approval from Amafa is required for any deviation to the approved plans.
- (6) No legal action will be instituted against you in this instance.



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Please note that the above is a structure protected in terms of the KwaZulu-Natal Heritage Act (4 of 2008), and that a permit must be obtained prior to any work being conducted in the future. Failure to do so is a criminal offence that is punishable by a term of imprisonment or a fine, or both. The property may also be forfeited to the state.
