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Final Decision

Eskom Holdings, Limpopo-Mpumalanga Cluster(LIMLANGA) is proposing to build MV and LV powerlines from the Nwarijane 22kV feeder near Bushbuckridge village. The project will be within the farms Maviljan 252 KU and Xanthia 253 KU, Ehlanzeni District municipality, Bushbuckridge Local Municipality, Mpumalanga province. The project will involve the digging of 2X2m and 2,4m deep holes to plant 14m wooden poles and install 100 kVA and 50 kVA transformers to supply households in the area

Eskom SOC Ltd, Limpopo-Mpumalanga Cluster (LimLanga) has submitted a section 38(1) of the National Heritage Resources Act, no 25 of 1999 (NHRA) application, on behalf of their applicant, to obtain a SAHRA decision in terms of section 38(2) of the NHRA for the construction of a new 22kV power line that is 826m in length, starting at NMJ feeder. The power line will be supplying electricity to various households in Shangan Hill village, the farms Xanthia 253 KU and Marviljan 252 KU, Bushbuckridge Local Municipality of Mpumalanga Province.

The photos provided to the case do not show any surface heritage features therefore, the potential impact on heritage resources is considered low. The construction of a 22 kV power line will not impact on heritage resources or change the character of the landscape. The likelihood of heritage artefacts being uncovered from the foundation excavations is low. However, the area is relatively undisturbed, and any construction close to the dry stream bed must be monitored by the construction manager. The overall power line is located in a grey palaeontology sensitive zone according to the SAHRIS palaeomap. According to the SAHRIS palaeomap policy, the development does not require a palaeontological impact assessment.

Final Decision

SAHRA Archaeology, Palaeontology and Meteorites (APM) Unit grants this application an exemption from



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further heritage assessments in terms of section 38(2)b of the National Heritage Resources Act, no 25 of 1999 (NHRA).

SAHRA has no objections to this proposed development going ahead and this Final Decision applies to the provisions of the NHRA only.

The following conditions still apply and need to be added to Appendix C 1.22:

If there are any new heritage resources discovered during construction and operation phases of the proposed development, then a professional archaeologist or palaeontologist, depending on the nature of the finds, must be contracted as soon as possible to inspect the findings at the expense of the developer.

If the newly discovered heritage resources prove to be of archaeological or palaeontological significance, a Phase 2 rescue operation may be required at the expense of the developer. Mitigation will only be carried out after the archaeologist or palaeontologist obtains a permit in terms of section 35 of the NHRA (Act 25 of 1999). If any unmarked human burials are uncovered and the archaeologist called in to inspect the finds and/or the police find them to be heritage graves, then mitigation may be necessary and the SAHRA Burial Grounds and Graves (BGG) Unit must be contacted for processes to follow (Mimi Seetelo 072 802 1251).
