The above heritage report was submitted for the proposed repair and upgrading of an existing 16.4km open canal which runs the length of the Onseepkans settlement. It is proposed that the original earth and concrete canal be replaced by a closed concrete pipeline. According to the submitted Draft BAR, the canal has been repaired and upgraded on numerous previous occasions.

The pipeline will be placed within the existing footprint of the canal. Existing flood protection structures, as well as the intake and outlet works will also be repaired and upgraded. This part of the proposed work is unlikely to impact on significant heritage resources.

Seven borrow pits are proposed to provide fill and bedding material for the upgrade. Each proposed borrow pit measures less than 1ha in extent. The submitted archaeological assessment investigated each borrow pit and identified a variety of low significance, *ex situ* archaeological material in all seven borrow pits. Graves were identified in BP1 and BP2b.

The proposed development is unlikely to impact on significant palaeontological heritage as the geological formations to be impacted have low palaeontological significance.

#### **Final Comment**

SAHRA has no objection to the proposed development on condition that;

- The boundaries of BP1 and BP2b are amended to exclude the identified graves. The identified graves may not be impacted by the proposed upgrade. The graves must be fenced off for the entire life span of the borrow pit and a buffer zone of 15m from the perimeter of the fence is required.
- Should any evidence of archaeological sites or remains (e.g., remnants of stone-made structures, indigenous ceramics, bones, **stone artefacts, ostrich eggshell fragments**, marine shell and charcoal/ash concentrations), unmarked human burials, **fossils** or other categories of heritage resources are found during the proposed activities, SAHRA APM Unit (Jenna Lavin/Colette Scheermeyer 021 462 4502) must be alerted immediately, and a professional archaeologist or palaeontologist, depending on the nature of the finds, must

be contacted as soon as possible to inspect the findings. If the newly discovered heritage resources prove to be of archaeological or palaeontological significance a Phase 2 rescue operation might be necessary.
