Kusel, U. June 2011. Cultural Heritage Resources Impact Assessment of Erf 5041 (Portion of Erf 1) Kuruman Municipality Ga-Segonyana Administrative District Northern Cape

Group 1 (North) (Pty) Ltd is proposing the development of the Leithlo Resort and Entertainment World south of the N14 between Kuruman and Kathu. The development will entail the construction of a casino, a hotel, conference facilities, and entertainment centre and water theme park. A 4km overhead power line will connect the facility to the Eskom grid. The combined footprint of the development will be approximately 1.21 ha. The proposed site is flat and lies in a region of Kalahari Bushveld vegetation; several large thorn trees occupy the centre of the site. The alternative proposed use for the site is a steel factory.

The archaeologist makes note of the presence of such important archaeological sites in the region as Wonderwerk Cave, the Kathu Pan and Townlands sites, which all contain highly significant quantities of MSA material, and the pigment mines at Tsantsabane and Doornfontein, which contain LSA material. The area was explored by white settlers from the early 1800s and is home to the Moffat Mission Station, established in the 1820s. Many of the early farmhouses are excellent examples of frontier vernacular architecture, built in hand hewn limestone. Manganese mining has been the predominant industry in the area for many years, with the mine at Black Rock the oldest.

The field survey yielded no heritage resources. No palaeontological assessment was conducted.

Case Decision:

SAHRA requires that:

 A professional Palaeontological Desk Top study is undertaken to assess whether or not the development will impact upon palaeontological resources. If this is deemed unnecessary, a letter of recommendation for exemption from a professional Palaeontologist is needed. If the area is deemed sensitive, a full Phase 1 Palaeontological Impact Assessment will be required and if necessary a Phase 2 rescue operation might be necessary (see <u>www.palaeontologicalsociety.co.za</u> for a list of professional Palaeontologists). The palaeontological assessment must be submitted to SAHRA APM Unit for comment before the development may proceed.
