Bamford, M. 2014. A Desktop Palaeontological Impact Assessment for the Proposed Eskom Medupi-Borutho Transmission Line, Limpopo Province, South Africa.

Thank you for the submission of the Palaeontological Impact Assessment.

According to the report submitted to SAHRA the proposed route of the transmission lines is on rocks of the Clarens Formation, undifferntiated Permian-Triassic sediments and the ancient Lebowa Granite Suite. It is further noted that the Clarens Formation is not suitable for the preservation of plant material and no vertebrate fossils have been reported from this area.

The specialist noted that the trocks of the Witkop area are much too old to contain fossils, and the rocks of the area north of Lephahale are not suitable for the preservation of fossil plants, and only rarely vertabrates. The specialist reported that since the excavations for the pylons are not deep enough to have significant impact on sensitive palaeontological resources.

### SAHRA Recommendations:

- 1. SAHRA is satisfied with the palaeontological assessment that was submitted and supports the recommendation of the specialist.
- 2. The SAHRA comment dated 21 July 2014 as it relates to the archaeological component and burial grounds and graves is still valid.
- 3. Should any evidence of archaeological sites or remains (e.g., remnants of stone-made structures, ceramics, bones, stone artefacts, ostrich eggshell fragments, marine shell and charcoal/ash concentrations), unmarked human burials, fossils or other categories of heritage resources are found during the proposed activities, SAHRA APM Unit (Colette Scheermeyer 021 462 4502) must be alerted immediately, and a professional archaeologist or palaeontologist, depending on the nature of the finds, must be contacted as soon as possible to inspect the findings. If the newly discovered heritage resources prove to be of archaeological or palaeontological significance a Phase 2 rescue operation might be necessary.
