Nel, J. & Karodia, S. August 2012. Heritage Statement and Letter Of Recommendation For Exemption: Heritage Impact Assessment For The Short Term Intervention For The Central Basin Of The Witwatersrand Gold Fields Acid Mine Drainage (AMD) Project.

The proposed development entails measures planned by the Trans-Caledon Tunnel Authority to mitigate the highly negative environmental effects of acid mine drainage in the Western, Central and Eastern Basins of the Witwatersrand Gold Fields.

To this end, a new water treatment plant will be constructed at the East Rand Proprietary Mines South West Vertical Shaft area and this construction will include: the installation of pumps, the construction of a new High Density Sludge plant, a waste sludge pipeline to the Crown Knights Gold processing plant, a treated water pipeline to the Elsburgspruit, and investigation and planning for a possible future waste sludge pipeline to an existing tailings disposal facility.

The proposed project area extends from Durban Roodepoort Deep in the west to ERPM in the east and the treatment plant will be situated approximately 1.8 km east of the Germiston Central Business District on the western portion of the East Rand Proprietary Mines South West Vertical Shaft area.

Following literature review, consulting of relevant databases and collections, cartographic surveying, consulting of previous heritage reports, and a site visit, the authors concluded that the project area has been highly disturbed through earlier mining activities and vandalism, and that the infrastructure that had been present has been demolished and removed. Only one building remains on the proposed abstraction property and at the proposed treatment plant, existing infrastructure dates to the mid-1970s.

The authors contend that the project area has been degraded to such an extent that no heritage resources can be expected to occur and have requested that this project be granted exemption from a full Heritage Impact Assessment.
