PROCLAMATION OF A MONUMENT.

I, Johannes de Klerk, Minister of Education, Arts and Science, under and by virtue of the powers vested in me by section 8 (1) (a) of the Natural and Historical Monuments, Relics and Antiques Act, 1934 (Act No.4 of 1934), hereby proclaim the Old Supreme Court, Cape Town, to be a monument.

DESCRIPTION.

A building on certain piece of unsurveyed State-owned land, situate between Adderley Street and Parliament Street, and between Bureau Street and Parliament Lane between the said land and the grounds of Parliament, known as the Old Supreme Court, Cape Town, which, according to Compilation Sheet BH-7DB/Y244, is now numbered as Erf 3740, Cape Town Central.

HISTORICAL INTEREST.

This building was originally completed in 1680 as the Dutch East India Company's Slave Lodge. It was converted for use as government offices in the 19th century by Thibault (Inspector of Government Buildings), Anreith (sculptor) and Schutte (contractor). For a time it housed the Supreme Court.
