PROCLAMATION OF A MONUMENT

I, Johannes de Klerk, Minister of National Education, under and by virtue of the powers vested in me by section 8 (1) (a) of the Natural and Historical Monuments, Relic sand Antiques Act, 1934 (Act 4 of 1934), hereby proclaim the dwelling-house "Waterhof' in the Gardens, Cape Town, to be a monument.

Description

A dwelling-house, known as "Waterhof", situate on a certain piece of land as shown in Diagram 5943/67, dated 10 November 1967, surveyed by Surveyor K. Coates in August 1967, being a Historical Monument Area over three portions of the remainders of Oranjezicht Erven 1372, 1373 and 1374, situate at Oranjezicht, in the City of Cape Town, Cape Division, Province of the Cape of Good Hope, and measuring 31.923 square feet, which is an unregistered consolidation of a portion of each of the three properties:-

- (a) Certain piece of land situate at the foot of Table Mountain, Cape Town, in the City of Cape Town, Cape Division, being the remainder of Erf 1372. Oranjezicht, and measuring (as such) 1 morgen 35 square roods 41 square feet 48 square inches;
- (b) certain piece of land situate at the foot of Table Mountain, Cape Town, in the City or Cape Town, Cape Division, being remainder of Erf 1373, Oranjezicht, and measuring (as such) 68 square roods 38 square feet; and (c) certain piece of land, situate towards the Kloof leading to Camps Bay, in the City of Cape Town, Cape Division, being the remainder of Erf 1374. Oranjezicht, and measuring (as such) 78 square roods 19 square feet.

Historical Interest

"Waterhof" was originally a part of Leeuwenhof, but became a separate property in 1782. The house was probably built in 1785 or 1786 and is one of the historic 18th-century houses on the slopes of Table Mountain.
