

WAR GRAVES AND NATIONAL MONUMENTS ACT,
No. 28 OF 1969

DECLARATION OF CERTAIN PROPERTY, INCLUSIVE OF THE HISTORIC CAPE DUTCH DWELLING-HOUSE KNOWN AS WESTOE AND THE OUTBUILDINGS, AT MOWBRAY, CAPE TOWN

By virtue of the powers vested in me by section 10 (1) of the War Graves and National Monuments Act, 1969 (Act 28 of 1969), I, Gerrit van Niekerk Viljoen, Minister of National Education, hereby declare the property described below, inclusive of the historic Cape Dutch dwelling-house known as Westoe and the outbuildings, at Mowbray, Cape Town, to be a national monument.

Description

The property, inclusive of the historic Cape Dutch dwelling-house and the outbuildings, situated as follows:

(a) The remaining one half ($\frac{1}{2}$) share in certain piece of land situate in the Municipality of Cape Town, Cape Division, being Erf 28143, Cape Town at Mowbray, and 2 674 square metres in extent.

(b) One half ($\frac{1}{2}$) share in certain piece of land situate in the Municipality of Cape Town, Cape Division, being Erf 28143, Cape Town, at Mowbray, and 2 674 square metres in extent.

Deed of Transfer 2909/1968, dated 16 February 1968 (endorsement page 3).

Historical and architectural interest

This property, which came into the possession of François Pieter de Necker in 1785, originally formed part of the farm Coornhoop. The Cape Dutch house known as Westoe, which was erected shortly afterwards by De Necker, was restored in 1967. The outbuildings date from the nineteenth century. 10/2/1032.
