

WAR GRAVES AND NATIONAL MONUMENTS ACT,
No. 28 OF 1969DECLARATION OF THE HOUSE KNOWN AS WHITE
GABLES, SITUATED AT 15 PARK ROAD, PORT
ALFRED

By virtue of the powers vested in me by section 10 (1) of the War Graves and National Monuments Act, 1969 (Act 28 of 1969), I, Pierre Cronjé, Deputy Minister of National

Education, hereby declare the house known as White Gables, situated at 15 Park Road, Port Alfred, together with the land in front of the building bordered by Park Road and three metres of land around the other three sides, as well as the servants' rooms at the rear of the house, to be a national monument.

Description

The so-called White Gables house, including of the servants' rooms, as well as the land in front of the house stretching to Park Road and three metres of land around the other three sides, situated on certain piece of freehold land in the Municipality of Port Alfred in the Division of Bathurst, being the Remainder of Erf 825, Port Alfred, in extent two thousand and sixty-one (2 061) square metres.

Historical and architectural interest

This early Victorian dwelling-house with its two impressive triangular front gables date from the 1830s and was erected by Captain Thomas Cowderoy. The two murals in the billiard room are also noteworthy. 10/2/1202.
