

WAR GRAVES AND NATIONAL MONUMENTS ACT,
No. 28 OF 1969

DECLARATION OF THE PROPERTY KNOWN AS
DEVONSHIRE VILLA, TOGETHER WITH THE LATE
VICTORIAN DWELLING THEREON, SITUATED AT
33 CARSTENS STREET, TAMBOERSKLOOF, CAPE
TOWN

By virtue of the powers vested in me by section 10 (1) of the War Graves and National Monuments Act, 1969 (Act 28 of 1969), I, Pierre Cronjé, Deputy Minister of National Education, hereby declare the property known as Devonshire Villa, together with the late Victorian dwelling thereon, situated at 33 Carstens Street, Tamboerskloof, Cape Town, to be a national monument.

Description

The property known as Devonshire Villa, together with the late Victorian dwelling thereon, described as certain land situate in the City of Cape Town, Cape Division, being Remainder of Erf 290, Tamboers Kloof, in extent one thousand three hundred and seventy (1 370) square metres.

Deed of Transfer T39381/1979, dated 28 December 1979.

Historical and architectural interest

This dwelling, which is an excellent example of late Victorian architecture, was erected in 1893-1894 by W. M. Cook, an affluent Cape Town draper and silk merchant. He named the property Devonshire Villa. 10/2/1201.
