# KITSO BURIAL GROUND REHABILITATION BRIEF STATUS REPORT

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#### 1. BRIEF REPORT

In 2018 part of a large burial ground at Kitso mine was disturbed during excavations using a TLB which inadvertently encroached, exposing the burial human bones. It is not known how many individual graves could have been affected, but certainly not many. The act, although obviously unfortunate, offended public sensibilities about graves, which sparked demonstrations by members of the Maremane community. The Maremane community are an important stakeholder holding surface rights over the mining area through a Community Property Association.

A number of meetings were held between Mine officials and the Maremane CPA. SAHRA was invited to provide oversight and to ensure that whatever remedial action was taken was in compliance with the heritage Act and supporting regulations. I was appointed by mine to provide specialist assistance as the process of finding appropriate remedial action started.

I attended two meetings between Mine Officials and the Maremane CPA executive committee in which it was eventually agreed that portion of the burial ground disturbed would be rehabilitated and the exposed bones reburied at the origin place with due respect local traditions. In accordance with my contract, my task was to put together the documentation required foot SAHRA to issue a permit for reburial of the human bones and rehabilitation of the burial ground in terms of Section 36 of NHRA.

The application was referred back to the Mine because one of the community members, Mr James Pule, through an email raised an objection citing the fact that he and other community members had not been consulted.

In view of that I have had several telephone conversations and emails with the Mine officials in order to respond to Mr Pule's submission. The mine officials have not responded. The matter rest there for now.

Im sorry it has taken me so long to reply tour correspondence of Monday 11 May 2020 . You may recall that in your last correspondence on the above matter you had informed me that Mr James Pule who claims to an affected party and a member of the Maremane Community (i.e. the local c community) had sent a written objection to SAHRA stating that he not been consulted. I had many email and telephone correspondences with Kitso Mine's Community Relations Manager and on one or two occassions a phone conversation with the Secretary of the Maremane Community Property Association concerning this matter. We had agreed that the CPA would submit a sworn affidavit in which they would state their position with respect to the objection raised by Mr Pule. As I mentioned above I made several phone calls backed up with written correspondences. I have not received the affidavit, and the matter appears to have rested there. Two weeks ago I sent an email to the Mine Executive Officer inquiring about the same matter. She acknowledged that the matter had not been closed. She was hesitant to make any 0 definitive statement under the circumstances of the health lockdown. I'm therefore sending her a reminder to act on the matter as the nationwide restrictions continue to be eased, and I will accordingly update you.
