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FIRST PHASE ARCHAEOLOGICAL AND CULTURAL HERITAGE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPOSED NEW PRISON AT PARYS, FREE STATE

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

A new penal complex is planned adjacent to the old prison at Parys, Free State.

The area proposed for development consists of vegetable gardens and grazing fields on the outskirts of town.

No graves or other historical or cultural remains could be found on the surface.

I recommend that the planning and development of the proposed new prison complex may proceed.

The old prison building dates back for more than one hundred years and it will probably be developed into a museum.

Concerning the old prison building I recommend that a permit should be obtained from the Free State Provincial Heritage Resources Agency (PHRA) and that the Free State Branch of the South African Heritage Resources Agency (SAHRA) in Bloemfontein, should also be involved before any renovations and alterations will be done to the old building.

INTRODUCTION AND DESCRIPTION

INVESTIGATION

The site for the proposed new prison at Parys was visited on 26 June 2007. The area was investigated on foot, GPS coordinates were taken on the peripheral points, and the features were recorded on camera. The different measuring points are the results of my own allocation.

The area was examined for possible archaeological and historical material and to establish the potential impact on any cultural material that might be found. The Heritage Impact Assessment (HIA) is done in terms of the National Heritage Resources Act (NHRA), (25 of 1999) and under the Environmental Conservation Act, (73 of 1989).

LOCALITY

The proposed new prison complex is planned on the outskirts of the town to the east of the existing prison (Map 2) (Map 1).

The following GPS coordinates (Cape scale) were taken (2627CD):

HISTORY OF THE OLD PRISON, PARYS

I could not find anything in writing about the history of the old prison. However, during a telephonic conversation with Mr Tienie van Rensburg, the prison commander, and with Mr André Ludwick, caretaker of the Parys Municipal Museum, I was able to learn a number of basic facts.

The middle part of the old prison building (Figs.15&16) dates from 1896 and is older than a hundred years. It also seems that the central part was later enclosed by a stone-wall, which had been built-up with the addition of a brick wall and covered in places by a corrugated roof.

FINDS

No graves or any other cultural or historical material were found in the area of development.

The old water irrigation furrow could date from earlier times, but will not be affected by the present developments.

ASSESSMENT OF IMPACT

The proposed developments will have no impact on any cultural and historical heritage remains at the Old Prison in Pays.

RECOMMENDATIONS

I recommend that the planning of the proposed developments at the prison at Parys could proceed.

I further recommend that the history and significance of the Old Prison at Parys should be investigated and that this should be taken into consideration during the restoration and renovation of the building.

MITIGATION

Concerning the area for the proposed developments, no mitigation measures will be required.

There are no obvious reasons to delay the commencement of further planning and development of the site.

I recommend that the proposed developments may proceed.

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
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


Map 1 Locality of Parys in relation to other town in the Vaal Triangle.
