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#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

Report on the exhumation and re-burial of human remains inadvertently discovered at Erf 5/648 IQ Vlakfontein Ext 1&2, Johannesburg, Gauteng Province

This report is submitted in fulfilment of the requirements of:

 The South African Heritage Resources Agency Permit No. 1856, issued under Section 36(3) of the National Heritage Resources Act, Act no. 25 of 1999

PGS Heritage was appointed by Blue Dot/Lilithalethu JV to undertake the rescue excavation and reburial of 2 inadvertently discovered graves at Erf 5/648 IQ Vlakfontein Ext 1&2, Johannesburg, Gauteng Province. The graves were accidentally discovered during the construction of an attenuation pond.

Public participation processes included the placing of site and newspaper notices, social consultations and documentary and archival research to identify the directly affected family of the deceased individuals.

The graves were claimed by Mr J Khumalo as that of his brother, Lucas Khumalo, a male individual who had died in a motor vehicle accident in 1963 at the age of 18 years and an unknown individual who was buried next to the Khumalo grave at a later stage. The Khumalo family gave written permission for the action.

To fully comply with applicable legislation, the permission of the Johannesburg Metro Council, the Gauteng Province Department of Health and the Gauteng Province Department of Co-operative Governance and Traditional Affairs was obtained. The mandated South African Police Services and Public Health authority for the area were notified in advance of the exhumation. A local Funeral Undertaker was appointed.

The exhumation was conducted on 10 September 2014 with representatives of the affected family in attendance. Fragments of human bone were recovered and placed in a single coffin, together with soil from the disturbed grave, at the request of the family present.

Re-burial was on the same day at Elandsfontein Municipal Cemetery, grave no: 582 Block B.

# 1. INTRODUCTION

The graves which are the subject of this report were inadvertently discovered during construction activities and were damaged and exposed in the process. It was recommended that the graves be relocated. The development impacting on the graves is an attenuation pond development of large extent on Erf 5/648 IQ Vlakfontein Ext 1&2, Johannesburg, Gauteng Province. All other permissions and permits required for the development had been granted and the installation of essential services and infrastructure had already started when the graves were found.

# 2. LOCATION OF THE GRAVES




Figure 2. Vlakfontein graves locality map.

The graves were found at S26.38251° E27.89113° (GPS) (Figure 2) on the north-western bank of the attenuation pond that was under construction (Figure 1).

## 3. CONSULTATION WITH AFFECTED PARTIES

# 3.1. Public notices

In order to identify the deceased individuals buried in the graves subject to relocation, the following public participation and social consultation activities were conducted:

The following public notices were placed:

No response was received as a result of the notices that were placed. Some community members, when asked, indicated that they had heard about and read the notices, but didn't respond since they did not have graves in that area.

# 3.2. Documentary and archival research

Documentary and archival research, with the aim of identifying the graves and the possible next-of-kin of the deceased individuals, was conducted by a professional historian with experience in archival research. The farm name or physical address where the graves are located, as well as any names from headstones and any available historical maps and photographs were included in the research.

No reference to graves on the property in question was found in any of the sources. According to the Alphabetical List of Farms in the Transvaal book the farm was previously named Vlakfontein 19, Roodepoort district. Documents and plans relating to this farm were found, but only such as show the name of the owner in 1939, etc. None referred to graves on the property.

# **3.3. Social consultation**

Based on the results of the above actions an extensive stakeholder based social consultation process, aimed at identifying and consulting with individually affected families, was conducted over a period of three months by a professional social consultant.

Social consultations took place at the site of the graves. As a result of this social consultation process, Mr JK Khumalo and Mr P Bans identified themselves as brothers of the buried individuals. The grave relocation process was explained to them and Mr Khumalo subsequently formally requested that the grave of his sibling be exhumed and the remains re-buried. Written permission was obtained from the affected family<sup>4</sup>.

# 4. LEGAL COMPLIANCE

- In terms of Section 36 of the National Heritage Resources Act (Act 25 of 1999) a rescue excavation permit was obtained: South African Heritage Resources Agency permit – ID: 1856<sup>5</sup>.
- To comply with the Removal of Graves and Dead Bodies Ordinance (Ord 7 of 1925), permission was obtained from the delegated Provincial MEC, which is also the authorized sphere of government identified in the Regulations Relating to the Management of Human Remains (No R 363 of 22 May 2013) of the National Health Act (No 61 of 2003): Gauteng Province Co-operative Governance and Traditional Affairs permit of 17 July 2014<sup>6</sup>.
- In terms of the Regulations Relating to the Management of Human Remains (No R 363 of 22 May 2013) of the National Health Act (No 61 of 2003), the Local and District Municipality which has jurisdiction to ensure the supervision of an Environmental Health Practitioner gave permission: Gauteng Province Health, Forensic Pathology Services permit of 3 July 2014<sup>7</sup>.
- In terms of the Regulations Relating to the Management of Human Remains (No R 363 of 22 May 2013) of the National Health Act (No 61 of 2003), the local SAPS was notified and arrangements were made for a member of SAPS to be present during the exhumation.

# 5. IDENTIFICATION OF THE GRAVES AND REMAINS

According to the affected family the individuals buried in the graves disturbed by the construction were:

- 1. Lucas Khumalo, a male individual who had died in a motor vehicle accident in 1963 at the age of 18 years
- 2. An unknown individual who was buried next to the Khumalo grave some time later.

# 6. METHODOLOGY

# 6.1. Methods of excavation

The methods employed during exhumation aimed to recover all the remains, to minimise damage to the remains, to record the three-dimensional context of the remains and to preserve and respect the dignity of the buried individual. All evidence that might allude to the events leading to the death of the individual and circumstances regarding the event were recorded and interpreted.

The excavation methods employed accomplished the *in situ* exposure of the burial and associated artefacts (Nienaber and Steyn, 1999). The focus was on accurate and complete documentation (Nienaber, 1997). Various methods for the excavation of graves have been proposed by different authors (Hester, 1975; Joukowsky, 1980; Krogman and Iscan, 1986; Morse, 1978) and all stress the need for adequate workspace around the exposed remains and a systematic approach to the removal of individual bones. The archaeological method, including extensive test trenching to prevent damage to the remains, was employed. This approach was largely similar to that of forensic archaeology where buried body cases are concerned. The approach was adapted for each situation since graves vary in shape, size, depth and content (Nienaber, 1999). The methods used in forensic archaeology are discussed by Steyn, et.al. (2000).

In each case, the surface features of the grave were cleaned and documented. Hereafter the cultural material associated with the surface dressing was collected and catalogued, if any occurred. All observations regarding construction, materials and characteristics of the surface features were documented.

After the removal of the surface features, the extent of the burial pit was ascertained through excavation and observation of differences in the matrix. After the indications of the presence and characteristics of the burial pit were documented, the in-fill was excavated to expose the human remains and associated cultural materials. Removal of the matrix of the burial pit was accomplished through the test-trench approach whereby a narrow trench (25-30 cm wide) is excavated with a trowel to a depth of between 15 and 20 cm in the lower third of the burial pit (in this instance the lower third usually constituted the eastern side of the grave). This area is chosen since it is most likely that the femurs of the skeleton occur in this part of the grave. Since the femur is a robust bone, it is usually not easily damaged through excavation. If no indications of the presence of human remains were observed in the test trench, the remaining in-fill matrix, down to the depth of the test trench, was removed with a shovel. The matrix surrounding the remains was carefully screened to retrieve any possible cultural artefacts associated with the burial. This process was repeated until indications of the presence of human remains were observed.

As soon as human remains were encountered, care was taken to leave as much of the skeleton as possible covered in order to protect the remains from damage by excavation and to preserve the integrity of the context of the skeletal elements and possible associated cultural remains. The extent and characteristics of the burial pit were now documented and the workspace was assessed and enlarged if not sufficient. This was only done after documentation of the features of the burial pit and without sacrificing any vital information.

The excavation then continued with the aim of ascertaining the extent of the skeletal remains and the location of the different skeletal elements after which the remains were uncovered, starting from the middle and working outwards. This method again ensures the minimum disturbance of the remains and associated cultural materials. As soon as the skeleton was uncovered, it was documented *in situ* and

removed. A further test trench of 15 cm deep was dug in the area directly underlying the location of the remains to ensure that all possible remains and artefacts were found and recovered.

# 7. EXHUMATION OF THE REMAINS

The site where the human remains were found was archaeologically excavated on 10 September 2014 with the family present.

The location, which had been cordoned off, was cleaned of vegetation and debris and the wall of the pond was systematically excavated and all material was screened through a 5 mm screen to recover any bone fragments present.

Various animal bones and small fragments of poorly preserved and damaged human bone were recovered. The total area where the initial find was made was excavated and all human bone was placed in a coffin for reburial. At the request of the family soil from the grave area was added to the coffin (Figure 3).

The excavated area was backfilled and the slope rehabilitated.

# 8. REBURIAL OF THE REMAINS

The reburial of the remains was conducted by Twala Ama-Africa Funeral Undertakers of Wynberg, Johannesburg on the same day as the exhumation and was attended by the family.

Reburial was in grave no: 582 Block B at Elandsfontein Municipal Cemetery.

- 5. All remains recovered, including relics and artefacts, as well as field notes and records, must be kept with the skeletal material and be reburied at the local municipal cemetery.
- 6. Reprints of all published papers or copies of theses and/or reports resulting from this work must be lodged with the relevant provincial heritage authority and SAHRA.
- 7. If a published report has not appeared within three years of the lapsing of this permit, the report required in terms of the permit will be made available to researchers on request.
- 8. It is the responsibility of the permit holder to obtain permission from the landowner for each visit, and conditions of access imposed by the landowner must be observed.
- 9. It is the responsibility of the permit holder to fill in excavations and protect sites during and after excavation to the satisfaction of the heritage authority and the landowner.
- 10. The heritage authority shall not be liable for any losses, damages or injuries to persons or properties as a result of any activities in connection with this permit.



- 1.2. If the deceased have not been buried in coffins, or if the state of decomposition of the coffins and the remains render compliance with condition 3.1 impossible, the remains and the contents of the graves must be placed in suitable containers immediately after exhumation.
- 1.3. The operation must be performed in such a manner as to cause no offence or danger to public health.
- 1.4. The handling of the remains must be carried out in a proper way by an undertaker and a disinfectant solution must be freely used.
- 1.5. The police authorities must be notified in writing at least seven (7) days before exhumation takes place.
- 1.6. All conditions imposed by the relevant local government(s), the Department of Health and any other authority must be complied with.
- 1.7. Any conditions imposed by the cemetery authorities must be complied with.
- 1.8. The permission holds good only in so far as this Administration is concerned.

# EXHUMATION AND REINTERMENT OF MORTAL REMAINS OF 2 GRAVES

The Department has no objection to the exhumation of the mortal remains of the abovementioned at: Farm VLAKFONTEIN EXT 1&2 and re-interment at: ELANDSFONTEIN CEMETERY.

The following conditions must be complied with:

- 1. The correct procedures have been followed to notify possible family members or effected parties.
- Handling of the mortal remains must be done by an Undertaker and disinfectants must be used freely.
- Under no circumstances must the coffin be opened. It must be placed in a hermetically sealed container and sealed for travelling, and must be placed in a new grave as soon as possible.
- 4. The proceedings must take place in such a manner that no offence is given, nor is there any danger to public health.
- 5. The necessary authorities must be notified at least (7) seven days before exhumation is to take place.

6. Any regulations promulgated by the cemetery-authorities must be complied with.
